Salary Software helps to automatically calculate the salary, generate salary slips and other required reports for various purposes. 9. The College has TDS software for filling TDS return which helps the college to maintain the data of income tax. 10 Fee of students is collected through online mode directly in the bank account of the college and data is prepared accordingly. 11 University Admission Portal is used for admission and data of students applying to each course, withdrawals, fee submission all is managed through this Portal. 12. - Satyawati College is a constituent college of University of Delhi. The curriculum is centrally designed by university departments and approved by the statutory bodies of the University- Academic Council and Executive Council. The

college ensures effective, transparent and timely delivery of the curriculum in a well-planned manner. • An effective delivery of the curriculum is ensured by planning and preparedness, which is ingrained in our academic practices. Departmental meetings are held before commencement of each semester, where decisions regarding optionals offered are taken. The workload is distributed in accordance with UGC guidelines. The minutes-of-the-meeting documents the process of workload distribution. • To ensure the continuum of growth and development of the institution in a holistic manner, faculty members regularly participate in Research and Faculty Development Programmes conducted by the college and other institutions and keep themselves abreast of current pedagogical developments. • An experiential, collaborative, interactive and participatory learning teaching experience is substantiated by students' field trips, and educational excursions to Museums, SEBI, RBI, and the Parliament, among others. • Our college provides space to certificate and diploma courses in foreign languages offered by Delhi University at a nominal fee. We have been associated with these courses for two languages- German and French, for many years. Our college also provides infrastructural and administrative facilities to School of Open Learning, University of Delhi (SOL) and IGNOU. • Effectiveness of curriculum delivery is ensured by planning and preparedness. The syllabi of every course consist of core papers and a wide array of optionals- Discipline Specific Electives (DSE), Generic Electives (GE) and Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC). While DSEs are restricted to students pursuing a particular course, GEs are interdisciplinary in nature. All these papers are integral to a successful completion of the course and each department meticulously works to achieve this target. Departmental meetings are held before commencement of each academic semester, where decisions regarding optionals to be offered are taken. • Satyawati College aims at helping students acquire proficiency in language and encourages linguistic harmony. Sanskrit, Urdu, and English form part of the regular curriculum. These departments organise seminars, conferences, quizzes, Hindi Divas, Mushaira etc. Additionally German, and French languages are taught as certificate and diploma course. In order to ensure linguistic inclusivity, students are encouraged to participate in the different cultural programme.

The college has constituted two moderation committees at two levels - 1. at the Departmental level and 2. at the college level. The Departmental moderation committee addresses the issues of students related to their internal examination/assignments/projects/practical examinations and their score in the examinations. At the College level we have a Central Moderation Committee. This committee looks into the matter of grievances of the students across the departments. This committee is monitored by the Principal as the Committee Chairperson. The Central Moderation Committee ensures that every grievance of students is addressed. The committee takes necessary measures to ensure objectivity and transparency in the process of its working. Notifications are displayed prominently on the college website and on college notice boards to communicate information related to internal assessment to students.

The teaching as well as the non-teaching staff of Satyawati College believe in smooth participative management and the college staff council, a statutory body, headed by the Principal furthers such administrative machinery. The staff council members are democratically elected through voting and their responsibilities pertaining to decision making policies of administrative affairs are made known. Abiding by the University of Delhi ordinance, staff

council committees are also formed in the beginning of the academic session and it is also made certain that all faculty members are part of these committees.

Each committee further has a convenor which reveals the participative management carried out by the college. Committees for Anti-ragging Measures, Disability/EWS/SC/ST/OBC, Remedial Teaching (Advanced/Slow Learner), Grievance Redressal Mechanism, Extension Activities And Neighbourhood Communities, Information And Communication Technology, Scholarship (Govt.), Gender Issues And Counselling, Waste Management Degradable/Non-Degradable, Green Campus Corridor/Conservation of Environment/Energy, Moral Value, Rights Duties Responsibilities, Fee Concessions, Celebration of National/International Commemorative, Days, Events and Festivals by the Institution, Yoga/Gym/Sports, North-east Society ensure the smooth functioning of the institute and an equal participation of the faculty members. The executive responsibilities of the Staff Council committees provide the faculty members to participate equally for the further development of the institute. Under the guidance of teachers from various departments, student centric committees contribute towards improving the participative environment of the college. The Governing Body is responsible for making decisions related to the college affairs. To manage and supervise the issues raised in the college, Governing Body meetings create a forum of discussion and interaction amongst the college authorities. It includes twelve members to be nominated by the Govt. of NCT of Delhi, including six from the panel of names sent by the University to the Govt. of NCT of Delhi. Two University Representatives to be nominated by the University of Delhi. The Principal of the Day College - Ex-officio (Member-Secretary), Principal of the Evening College, two Teacher representatives from the Day College also, two teacher representatives from the Evening College participate actively and maintain the records of the proceedings.

Curriculum Development	As a constituent college of University of Delhi, Satyawati College abides by the CBCS design of syllabi outlined for the undergraduate programmes. Various committees are duly formed to restructure and develop the curriculum of various departments as and when required. While being a part of Board of Studies/Committee of Courses, faculty members are actively involved in providing the desired guidelines for various courses. Necessary instructions are provided by them in order to sustain the smooth framing and changing the syllabi.
Teaching and Learning	The institute organises workshops and seminars to improve the teaching-learning process by involving the teaching staff, non-teaching staff and the students. Further, the regular classroom teaching is complemented with various seminars, conferences,

workshops, lectures, talks, educational tours, field trips and excursions. Students are encouraged to participate in all academic and co-curricular activities for academic excellence. The college has a placement cell called Saksham. The placement cell of the college guides the students in their every pursuit whether it be academic or employability. The Cell provides students with exposure to soft skill, training, industry and employment opportunities. Under the aegis of the Placement Cell companies are invited to hold workshops, interviews and discussions. It also conducts pre-placement talks and recruitment drives.

Examination and Evaluation

The college abides by the rubrics pertaining to examination, syllabi and evaluation mapped out by the University of Delhi curriculum. The college provides transparency to the students in displaying the Internal Assessment marks. The attendance and internal assessment record (assignments, tests and projects) are uploaded periodically on the college website and is accessible to the students and they are asked to check and sign their internal assessment record before it is uploaded on the University portal.

Research and Development

Faculty members of the college are provided study leave for their doctoral research. According to UGC guidelines, the college sanctions leave for training programmes as well as workshops. Several faculty members across departments are involved in research projects. A few faculty members also supervise Ph.D candidates. The institute encourages research for both faculty members and students.

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation

The college library subscribes to a total of 25 newspapers and 20 magazines/Journals. Customized computers with internet facilities, learning aids like Braille reading material, and being well-equipped with modern-day teaching-learning apparatus such as LCD projector and Computer Cabin. 7.1.7 – Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly (at least five)

? The Department of Environmental Studies formed environmental society 'PRAKRITI' to empower students and teachers to participate and organise meaningful activities. It aimed in helping students to explore environmental concepts and actions beyond the confines of curriculum. ? With the aim of distinguishing species and promoting green campus awareness Satyawati College started an initiative of labeling of trees. ? Waste management is a key to the eco-friendly campus for which installation and labeling of dustbin was done by Prakriti Society. Bio-degradable wastes includes food wastes, canteen waste, etc. were disposed in the green dustbin and Non-biodegradable wastes such as plastic, tins and glass bottles were disposed in the red dustbin. Sewage systems are bolstered to prevent any kind of leakage or infiltration of sewage water. ? In order to spread awareness on environmental issues, annual international event 'Earth Hour' was celebrated by the college on 25th March in which non-essential lights were turned off from 8:30 pm to 9:30 pm in college premises. ? The college organized various programs viz. poster making, talk show, photography competition, symposium and documentary screening etc. to encourage environmental consciousness and protection.

7.2 – Best Practices

7.2.1 – Describe at least two institutional best practices

1. Providing Barrier-free Access To ensure seamless integration and inclusion of students with benchmark disabilities in the classroom is among the foremost priorities of Satyawati College. Assistive devices have been provided to ensure the same. The institution is also working towards appropriate technology-based tools, as well as adequate and language-appropriate teaching-learning materials. Research is clear that the earlier such support begins, the better the chances of progress. Teachers must be helped to identify such learning disabilities early and plan specifically for their mitigation. Along with gender sensitization and sensitization towards all underrepresented groups in order to reverse their underrepresentation, alternative forms of pedagogy have been encouraged. The focus is on the academic, intellectual, social and cultural life of our students with the intent to empower them to participate and contribute at par with the general students. Primary challenges like disabling environment, academic and social barriers are addressed in planning the function and resources of EOC every academic session. • The month of October 2016 was dedicated to counseling sessions for students with disabilities. Their grievances were noted, a plan of action was prepared and Angel PRO device was distributed. The college also provided laptops to PWD students in the first year and designated a room for interaction and counselling of PWD students. • The college through Equal Opportunity Cell plans the academic year with seminars, workshops, talent hunt events, Intercollegiate competitions, and personality development and career guidance sessions for a wholesome year where all extra curriculum needs are served and opportunities offered to strengthen the career prospects of our PWD students. Our panel discussions are aligned to develop and hone the employability skills of PWD students. ? On 2nd February 2017, a multilingual intra-college debate competition on 'The Pursuit of Equality Necessitates Discrimination' was organized. Students participated enthusiastically. ? On 17th February 2017, a panel discussion cum interactive session on 'Progressive Opportunities for Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan)' was held. Mr. PK Pincha, Ex-Chief Commissioner for persons with disabilities under the Ministry for Social Justice and Empowerment, Mr. Vikas Gupta, Assistant Professor at the Department of History and Mr. Pankaj Kushwaha, a research scholar at JNU deliberated on the ways in which opportunities could be expanded for advancement, transcending social, psychological and physical barriers. ? On 28th March 2017, UMANG 2017 was held. It accommodated the perspectives of all equal opportunity enthusiasts. The inclusive Annual Festival witnessed packed house overflowing with passion for

different art forms where specially-abled students exhibited their talent through quiz competition, poetry recitation, just-a-minute and singing competition. 2. Quest for Transformation through Dialectics Intent to transform is the quintessence of public speaking. With a vision to foster the art of debating by expressing ideas in a cogent manner and to develop a sense of tolerance towards conflicting viewpoints, a pragmatic sense of approach has been engendered by Abhivyakti, the Debating Society of Satyawati College. It encourages the ability to critically analyze pertinent issues by the virtue of extensive research. ? Abhivyakti, with every Intra-College, Inter- College and All India Level Debate organized this year, has aimed to justify its motto which is carved on the agenda 'change through deliberation'. ? To acquaint members with varied styles of debating, it was deliberated, to diversify the form of debates organized by the society. Therefore, Jaswant Kaur Memorial All India Debate, a conventional style debate was revolutionized into a three-tier debate tournament to make it more interesting and intellectually stimulating for both - participants as well as for the audience. The medium of the debate was English and Hindi only, keeping in view the structure of the debate. However, the society followed its prolonged practice of organizing debates on a multilingual basis, i.e., in English, Hindi, Urdu, and Sanskrit. ? An orientation programme was organized on 5th August 2016 to enlighten students about Abhivyakti and was followed by a Speech Competition on the topic "Impact of Social Media on Society". Sixty-five speakers articulated their thoughts out of which first prize was bagged by Khushal Garg ? With the intent to inculcate the spirit of debating among newcomers, a Freshers Debate was organized on 28th September 2016. 28 participants debated on the motion Education and Health are Essential for Human Security ? In observance of Vigilance Awareness Week, Abhivyakti associated with Punjab National Bank and conducted an Intra- College Debate on the motion Promotion of integrity and eradication of corruption is only possible through public support on 3rd November 2016. ? The third edition of Janak Kapoor Memorial All India Debate was organized on 20th January 2017. The motion of the debate was "Digitalisation of Economy is Viable in Existing Cyber Security Set-Up." Fifty-eight debaters from different universities across India participated in the debate. The Best Speaker Prize was won by Najm Mehdi from Aligarh Muslim University. ? The Jaswant Kaur Memorial All India Debate, a homage to the late Mrs. Jaswant Kaur, was organized on 15th February 2017. A total of 22 Teams competed for three prizes. Students of Kirori Mal College lifted the Jaswant Kaur Memorial Running Trophy for their exceptional performance in both languages. ? The second edition of the Annual Inter-College Turncoat Debate - Equinox was held on 10th April 2017 in association with Opinia360. The idea was to revolutionize the art of debating. For the first time ever audience's vote was given weightage in the selection of the winners. Twenty-two participants participated in the debate. ? Society has won four Best Team Prizes. Dr. Zakir Hussain Memorial Running Trophy was brought home by TanurimaShau and Gargi in a debate organized by Zakir Hussain College ? The team also qualified for the Semi-Finals of Great Debate by the British High Commission organized in Lady Shri Ram College. The team of Siddharth Singh and TanurimaShau was adjudged as the best team in Swami Shraddhanand College (competing against more than 35 teams) and Lady Hardinge Medical College.
