1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

• Satyawati College pledges commitment to ensures effective, transparent and timely delivery of the curriculum in a well-planned manner. It is a constituent college of the University of Delhi. An effective delivery of the curriculum is ensured by planning and preparedness, which is ingrained in our academic practices. • The curriculum is centrally designed by university departments and approved by the statutory bodies of the University, namely Academic Council and Executive Council. Colleges and departments have representation in these bodies through an election held once in two years. For the last few years, faculty members from Satyawati College have been part of these academic bodies and have actively contributed in the smooth functioning of teaching- learning. • In the Academic year 2018-19, Mr. Shashi Shekhar Prasad Singh, Assistant Professor, Department of Political Science, Satyawati College was an elected member of the Academic Council of the University of Delhi. • An effective delivery of the curriculum is ensured by planning and preparedness, which is ingrained in our academic practices. Departmental meetings are held before commencement of each semester, where decisions regarding optionals offered are taken. The workload is distributed in accordance with UGC guidelines. The minutes-of-the-meeting documents the process of workload distribution. • Timely publication of the time-table ensures on-time commencement of classes. Teachers invariably combine lectures with student presentations, group discussions, debates, field-visits etc. These modes of teaching-learning make classroom an exciting space both for students and the teacher • The syllabi of every course consist of core papers and a wide array of optional courses- Discipline Specific Electives (DSE), Generic Electives (GE) and Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC). While DSEs are restricted to students pursuing a particular course, GEs are interdisciplinary in nature. All these papers are integral to a successful completion of the course and each department meticulously works to achieve this target. Departmental meetings are held before commencement of each academic semester, where decisions regarding options to be offered are taken. • ICT tools and its effective usage is of seminal importance in the new era of digitalization of education. Our college has two well facilitated computer laboratories, smart boards and the campus is WIFI enabled. Considering the need to make education holistic and inclusive for differently abled students, a provision for JAWS computers has been made. There are over 200 braille fitted books and Daisy devices are available. Such provisions are also coupled with the suitable physical infrastructure such as ramps and dedicated parking space. • Continuous internal assessment through assignments (individual and group), tests, projects, quizzes, presentations monitor progress of students. The process of internal evaluation prepares students for the term-end examinations conducted by the University as well as competitive job scenario.

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2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The college follows the evaluation policy laid down by the University. The system of 10 marks for Assignment, 10 marks for test and 5 marks for the attendance is followed. The results and the attendance of the students is displayed. The teachers, however, create more opportunities to make the process of evaluation more a process of life- long learning. Student centric projects, projects which disseminate greater environmental awareness, or which highlight consumerism we have fallen prey to deepen the Internal Assessment process and at the same time makes it more enjoyable for the students and teachers alike. The students' grievances regarding marks are satisfactorily addressed. The college has a two-tiered structure at the Departmental level and the level of college for the same. Also in case of medical ground or other permissible grounds the students are given another chance to submit their class test, assignments etc. Similarly, the college makes special arrangements of class tests and assignment submission for the students of NSS and NCC if they were out of city or engaged in other important activities like Republic Day Parade etc. Such students are also given concessions in attendance.

Maintaining an IQAC in Satyawati College has led to many advantages like constantly enhancing quality, improving gradation, and all-around development in the growth and progress of the college through with 'conscious, consistent and catalytic' improvement. It facilitates the involvement and engagement of all-important stakeholders of the college. Instructors are also available to guide students for proper handling of equipment and best execution of exercise. The students are also involved in practicing yoga by attending yoga classes during 8 - 10 am throughout the year. A yoga instructor is also available to the students for assistance with the exercises. The Family Counselling Centre of the college introduces to the students an extensive understanding of gender issues, women empowerment, and social well-being. The centre conducts regular counselling by the FCC counsellor Miss Anjali Sinha who guides students by enlightening them about the measures to be undertaken for stress management. The centre regularly organizes group discussions, documentary screenings, creative writing competitions, workshops, and talks pertaining to domestic violence, sexual harassment at professional spaces, further sensitizing students about gender issues. Apart from these activities the centre also maintains a wall-magazine for the purpose of creating sensibility among students regarding such issues and also lends them books from the FCC Library. Students of the college are

felicitated with various scholarships and financial aid to students who are genuinely needy. The scholarships given to students include government-aided scholarship schemes like National Scholarship Portal, Prime Minister's Scholarship Scheme, and Student and Aid Fund. Other available scholarships include non-government schemes such as Help the Blind Foundation and National Institute of Visually Impaired. These aids help the students to ensure that no learner is deprived of the opportunity of education due to physical or financial limitations.

6.4 – Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 – Institution conducts internal and external financial audits regularly (with in 100 words each)

Internal Audit: Satyawati College conducts Internal Financial Audit periodically by reviewing and cross checking every transaction at multiple points through Account SO, Account AO, Bursar, and Principal of the College. All staff members are informed of proper and valid documentation. Proof is attached in support of all transactions and expenditures that require reimbursement from college. This is to ensures that proper records are maintained and justification available for all expenditures and payments done.

External Audit: The external audit is regularly conducted after the end of each financial year. The college appoints a Chartered Accountant for the purpose. Vouchers and proper records of the concerned departments regarding capital expenditure is placed before the Chartered Accountant for verification. Departmental Accession Register, Dead Stock Registers/Purchase Registers are checked. The Utilization Grant Certificates showing expenditure under various heads is also placed for auditing. Furthermore, Statutory external audit and assessment of Income-Expenditure and Receipt-Payment is also done by CAG and Govt. of NCT.

One such initiatives of IQAC is making available to the visually impaired students Angel, an assistive light weight pocket sized device. 35 Angel devices were provided by the college to all the visually challenged students on 16 September 2018. The device with simple tactile buttons, 8 GB internal memory and other features like E-Book recording, MP3 Player, 92 hours continuous recording with clear noise feature, repeat function for revision or transcription of dictation, voice recorder, stop watch, calculator and compass for the Blind assists in learning endeavours. IQAC decided to enhance the cleanliness of the college and make it ecologically sound for which it organized plantation drive in collaboration with NSS in 2019. 50 participants with teaching and non-teaching staff took active part in this plantation drive. In addition to minimize adverse impact of pollution on environment and to make its surroundings sustainable Satyawati college entered into partnership with yulu, battery operated bikes. The college agreed to provide designated parking spaces for parking 10 Yulu vehicles and kiosk spaces within the college premises.

Energy efficiency and conservation are top most priorities of Satyawati College. The colleges lighting is a mix of LED and CFL. The installed air conditioners of the college are rated three to five stars (Bureau of Energy Efficiency, (BEE)). The high-capacity lighting used at the outdoor areas of the campus are likewise energy-efficient. Remote controlled light management system has been set up to reduce the waste of electricity. Energy conservation is also taken care of by cleaning, replacing air conditioner filter, and electrical equipment on time to time basis. Classrooms and labs have been built to be lit with ample natural lights which aids in saving energy. Moreover, the lawn in front of the staffroom reduces the need of artificial heating during cold winter days. The wiring system is properly designed and installed with the proper control valve which saves energy.

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7.1.7 – Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly (at least five)

The garden committee played a crucial role in the beautification of the premises and helps to build a culture of pollution free green campus. Numerous steps were taken to plant indigenous trees and flowers by teachers and students of the college to make the campus vibrant, colorful and aesthetic. A series of cleanliness drives were initiated by environmental society Prakriti to increase awareness among students and teachers. Plastics free signboards were also installed in the premises as a part of the drive. Eco-friendly management of degradable and non-degradable waste remains the topmost priority of Satyawati College. A composting facility is maintained in the college for the biodegradable waste and the compost is used in the college nursery. Both the roof and surface runoff water is collected to the dedicated rainwater

harvesting pit. Storm drains are designated to drain excess rain and groundwater from the paved streets, parking lots, sidewalks and roofs. Hazardous waste material autoclave machines and bacteriological incubator are installed in the Environmental Lab to discard microbes and other infection causing agents.

7.2 – Best Practices

7.2.1 – Describe at least two institutional best practices

1) Gender Parity The Family Counselling Centre (FCC) spearheads gender equity initiatives at Satyawati College. It functions under the aegis of Delhi Social Welfare Board and Central Social Welfare Board (a support Unit of Ministry of Women and Child Development, Government of India. While the Indian education system has made steady progress towards bridging gender gaps, enormous disparities still remain -particularly Socio-Economically Disadvantaged Groups (SEDGs) circumscribing gender identities (particularly female and transgender individuals). FCC has been at the forefront of sensitizing students about gender concerns and advancing expert counselling sessions to students and staff. It aims at constructing an egalitarian environment by creating a gender-responsive institution. At the outset, the orientation programme was followed by an exchange of views on gender issues that inflict our society at large. ? The Centre has employed myriad mediums like theatre, film screenings, discussions, wall magazines, lectures-cum-workshops, webinars, and competitions to generate awareness regarding the position of women in society. It encompasses a well-stocked library to disseminate knowledge through the printed word about gender disparities. ? FCC is deeply invested in engaging the student community in a dialogue that encourages an informed understanding of gender. It facilitates students and faculty to work towards creating an enabling space that resonates with the FCC's motto- "Let's Talk!". ? In the month of August 2018, an awareness programme on 'Himmat App' was held in college by Delhi police. FCC actively took part in this programme. It organized a Poster Making Competition on 'Gender Bias' and 'Women Empowerment on 30th August 2018 in which students participated enthusiastically. ? A bilingual Creative Writing Competition on the topic 'Women Empowerment was organized by FCC on 4th September 2018 to ascertain the ideas of youth on the mechanisms of women empowerment. ? Events on contemporary issues which are being discussed in media and society have also been held. A Group Discussion on the topic 'Women and Places of Worship' was held on 3rd October 2018. Group Discussion on '#MeToo' Movement was organized on 1st November 2018. ? In February 2019, a conversation on "Gender Disparity in Education and the Workplace" was held to assess the gaps and silences in gender discourse. ? FCC is not limited to creating awareness regarding social inequalities but also tries to motivate students to question the underpinning social norms and practices. It aims at building conscious youth who work towards creating an egalitarian society. Against this backdrop, the documentary screening of 'JUICE' was held on 25th March 2019. ? In addition to physical health, Satyawati College also puts a premium on psychological health. Ms. Anjali Sinha is the FCC counsellor whose consultation has proven to be beneficial for both students and faculty. A workshop on 'Stress and Time Management' was conducted by Ms. Anjali Sinha on 28th March 2019. She suggested several ways of coping with exam-related stress. Emphasis on time management was underscored. ? Students and faculty members have periodically consulted FCC Counsellor for all kinds of stress-related to their personal as well as academic life and she has dedicatedly attempted to resolve the issues through proper guidance. 2) Cultivating Intellectual Leadership and Physical Fitness Nurturing exceptional and enthusiastic institutional leaders that cultivate distinction and innovation is the need of the hour. Outstanding and effective institutional leadership is extremely important for the success of an institution and of its faculty. Taking a cue from the legacy of Indian

socio-political and economic leadership, Gandhi Study Circle at Satyawati College aims to promote and generate interest in the youth about Mahatma Gandhi and is an extension of Gandhi Bhawan, Delhi University. Diverse activities are conducted every year which are coordinated by Gandhi Bhawan. ? Gandhi Study Circle held a lecture on 'The Gandhi-Tagore Debate' in 2018 to expand the horizon of understanding. Prof. Subrata Mukherjee, former Head, Department of Political Science, delivered the lecture. ? A National Seminar on 'Gandhi, Ambedkar, Lohia and the issue of Social Justice' in the month of September 2018 was organised to reflect upon the ideals that framed Indian ethos. Padmashree Prof. Pushpesh Kant was the keynote speaker. ? A National Symposium on 'Understanding Gandhi' was organized in October. Prof. Ramesh Bhardwaj, Director, Gandhi Bhawan was the Chief Guest. ? A debate was organized on the topic "Is Ambedkar replacing Gandhi?" in February 2019. ? In collaboration with National Gandhi Museum, an International Conference was organized on Contemporary Relevance of Gandhi in February 2019. Mr. A Annamalai, Director, National Gandhi Museum was the Chief Guest and Dr. Ritu Gairola Khanturi, Associate Professor, University of Texas at Arlington, USA, was the keynote speaker. In addition to nurturing intellectual leadership, physical fitness is given equal importance. The Department of Physical Education, Satyawati College made great strides in stimulating the competitive spirit. ? Dr. Rekha Sharma from the Department of Physical Education, Satyawati College represented India as a Manager of Girls Kho-Kho Team, for the first International Kho-kho Tournament held at London between 1st September to 6th September 2018. She also presented a paper in a UGC Sponsored National Conference held at Laxmibai College Delhi University on 27th and 28th March 2019 on 'Impact of Sports on Lifestyle of Youth'. ? Satyawati College hosted Delhi State Kho Kho Championship in the college sports ground on 13th and 14th July 2019. ? Keeping the tradition alive, Sandeep Suri Memorial Cricket Tournament was held between 25th February-15th March 2019 at college ground. Teams from other states participated in the same.

Environment-Friendly Campus. • Satyawati College prioritises the cause of environmental conservation by providing several platforms to promote the agenda of environmental protection and sustainable practices. • On the occasion of World Environment Day 2018, Satyawati College launched, "Clean Delhi Green Delhi" and "Beat Plastic Pollution" cleanliness drive under the aegis of Prakriti Society to encourage a sense of responsibility among students and teachers. Another cleanliness drive with a much bigger dimension was undertaken by Prakriti Society and the event was graced by Mr. Ranveer Tanwar, a renowned environmentalist. • Satyawati College organised various programs and activities to inculcate awareness for a sustainable environment. A street play or Nukkad Natak Environment was organized on the eve of Gandhi Jayanti depicting the immature and excessive exploitation of resources thereby creating an imbalance in nature. • The 4th Delhi Youth Summit was organized at Miranda House on climate change in which members and office bearers of Prakriti society participated to discuss, debate and pen down a charter for urban environmental sustainability. A new initiative was also introduced in this context by screening a documentary called An Inconvenient Truth by the former US presidential nominee A L Gore which focused on issues such as climate change

and global warning. The screening was followed by an interactive session between students and faculty members. • An inter-college debate competition 'Whats the Issue?' on the topic of 'Dam-a source of renewable energy or destroyer of nature' was held in which students from different colleges participated and shared their views on various pros and cons of hydroelectricity generation and displacement of the habitat. The institution also promoted the 4R method through the practice of Refuse, Reduce, Reuse, and Recycle of waste material.

To accomplish the 4R's a donation drive was initiated by the Department of Environmental studies. The material collected in this drive was distributed to the needy students of the University of Delhi. A two-day event Jashn-E-Prakriti was held for students to showcase their skills. An online photography competition and intercollege open mic competition were also a part of events that promoted a change in lifestyle through sustainable practices. • A different perspective on environment and its effect was deliberated upon in the seminar on the topic Gene-environment and society inter-relatedness in Indian skin colour variation by Anshuman Mishra (Deputy Director VBRI group). • The garden committee has been instrumental in making the college campus with, pollution-free, beautiful, and green. A series of steps were undertaken by planting numerous plants on the premises to make the campus green. Indigenous and exotic species of the flower were planted and grown to make the college more vibrant, colourful, and aesthetic. A plant and flower show was organised on the 28th of March 2019, with a wide range of exotic, home-grown, and flowering plants. The vibrant display was equally appreciated by students, teachers, and nonteaching staff.
